here are lots of jokes about the genie in the bottle who offers people three wishes. Whatever the joke, the punchline is always the same: the people end up squandering their good fortune or getting more than they bargained for.

What made Solomon wise was the fact that he knew his own weaknesses and sought make himself a better person. He didn't ask for fame or wealth. Knowing that he was young and unskilled in government, he asked God to make him into a really good king for his people.

For wisdom isn't about being worldly wise or streetwise. It's not a question of intelligence or even being a clever person. Wisdom is about looking at yourself
