

PARISH PARTNERSHIPS



In 2015 Towers Watson produced a report for the Archdiocese of Dublin which provided a sobering analysis of priest numbers and parish sustainability, with projections extending to 2030.

Projected Decline in Priest Number and Aging Clergy

By 2030, the number of priests in active ministry was projected to drop by 61–70% depending on whether religious orders continued their parish commitments. The Best-case scenario: the number of priests would drop from the 2014 number of 369 priests down to 144. This number included the number of non-diocesan priests, i.e. those from the various religious orders. If religious orders withdrew due their own aging and decline numbers, this would leave Dublin with only 111 diocesan priests who would be available for parish ministry across Dublin's 200 parishes. As of 2014, 57% of priests were over 60, and this was expected to rise to 75% by 2030.

Building Hope (Parish Partnerships)

This has led to the development of a pastoral renewal process called "Building Hope". The "Building Hope" initiative is the Dublin Archdiocese's bold and prayerful response to the pastoral challenges of our time—especially the decline in clergy numbers, shifting faith engagement, and the need for renewal. Launched by Archbishop Dermot Farrell in 2021, it's a pastoral renewal process aimed at reimagining parish life in light of current realities and encouraging partnerships between parishes to share resources and energy.

With an aging clergy and fewer vocations, the number of Sunday Masses may need to drop from 836 to around 331 to avoid overburdening priests. As part of the Archdiocese of Dublin's "Building Hope" initiative, all 200 parishes across the diocese are now grouped into 53 partnerships to foster collaboration, shared mission, and deeper community engagement.

Monkstown is part of a partnership of five parishes which comprise: Monkstown, Blackrock, Kill o the Grange, Newtownpark and Foxrock

Commentary on the readings for the 27th Sunday of Ordinary Time carmelites.ie

Habakkuk 1:2-3, 2:2-4;

In our first reading from the Prophet Habakkuk we are told that the "upright man will live by his faithfulness." At times we all struggle and wonder if God is present but the reading reminds us that God is always there even in the most difficult of moments.

Luke 17:5-10

In our gospel text from St Luke we see Jesus exhorting the disciples to unwavering faith in response to their quest for greater faith. They had asked him to increase their faith but his reply puts the onus back on them to increase their own faith. Faith is a free gift from God to all of his sons and daughters but it is also a gift which we must work at if it is to achieve its potential in our lives.

2 Timothy 1:6-8, 13-14;

In our second reading we see St Paul exhorting his readers to "fan into a flame the gift that God gave" them, a gift which was not a quiet thing but a thing of great power and love. This can be done with the assistance of the Holy Spirit if we but open our hearts to his power within us.

Fr Kevin's Reflection

The Apostles said to Jesus "Lord, increase our faith"

Were your faith the size of a mustard seed

The sixth-class student went to her mother with this homework question: "What's the difference between potential and actual?"

Mom thought for a moment, and then replied, "Go ask your dad, your brother and your sister what they would do if they found a million euro and no one knew they had. Would they turn it in or keep it?"

The student goes first to her older brother with the question. "Are you kidding? That would pay for college and set me up in business. It's probably drug money anyway. Of course I'd keep it."

She writes down his answer and then goes to her sister.

"Of course I'd keep it, silly. It's probably a bribe or payoff that got lost anyway. I'd shop till I dropped and then I'd bank the rest. I'd be set for life."

The student writes down her answer and then goes to talk to Dad. "Well, anybody who loses a million euro can probably afford it. I'd do over the house, put you kids through school, and then have something left for my retirement."

The student goes back to Mom and shows her the answers.

"Now do you see the difference between potential and actual?" she says.

"Potentially, we are an honest family but actually you and I live with three conniving thieves."

In today's Gospel, Jesus chides our tendency to rationalize our self-centeredness, to congratulate ourselves on our "faithfulness" by acting in ways that are the direct opposite of that faith. As the sixth-class student learns, our potential is realized only if we actually live the principles and beliefs we utter in prayers and creeds.

Christ calls us to embrace "mustard seed" faith -to believe that even the slightest act of goodness, done in faith and trust in God's presence, has meaning in the reign of God. The mustard seed challenges us to grab hold of the opportunities we have for planting and reaping a harvest of justice, compassion and reconciliation in our own piece of the earth. Faith begins with the gratitude and humility of the servant in today's Gospel: to understand that the gift of faith requires justice, compassion and forgiveness; to realize, in the clarity of God's love, how blessed we have been; to see ourselves and others as brother and sister "servants" at the table of the Father.

As the leaves turn and the days grow shorter, the Church invites us into a deeper rhythm of prayer through the **Month of the Holy Rosary**. October is dedicated to this cherished devotion, reminding us that in every mystery of the Rosary, Mary walks with us—pondering, interceding, and drawing us closer to Christ.
